1. The Florida Board of Medicine says a West Palm Beach surgeon has agreed to pay a \$3,000 fine for removing a woman's healthy kidney that he thought was a tumor. The Palm Beach Post reported that Dr. Ramon Vazquez was responsible for cutting Maureen Pacheco open in 2016 so two other surgeons could perform a back operation. Pacheco had a kidney that never ascended into her abdomen, and Vazquez believed it was a cancerous tumor and removed it without her consent. Vazquez has said he didn't review her medical records before the surgery. Pacheco later sued the two primary doctors, who each settled for \$250,000. He must also attend training on preoperative patient evaluation. (MAIN, A2)
