1. The two-mile Highway 99 tunnel opens early Monday. The tunnel is built to last 100 years, so future generations might find new ways to use the \$3.3 billion investment with cleaner vehicles or other innovations. Meanwhile, Seattle now has waterfront without the 80-decibel roar of the viaduct, which closed for good last month.

What is unique about the new tunnel and makes it stand out among others in North America? (MAIN)

2. Who is Punxsutawney Phil and what legend is he known for? (MAIN)
3. The first paper money in America was issued by the Massachusetts Bay Colony to finance a military expedition to Canada. What year did this happen? (MAIN)
4. Since December, distressed bakers had wondered what had happened to Hershey's Kisses after they opened package after package, only to find the \_\_\_\_\_ were missing. (MAIN)
5. A recent Seattle Women's Commission (SWC) and King County Bar Association Housing Justice Project study analyzed nearly 1,600 evictions in Seattle in 2017 and 2018 and found that nearly \_\_\_\_\_ percent of people evicted ended up living with friends or family, in transitional housing or without any other options for immediate shelter. 8. New studded tires would carry a \$100 fee if purchased after July 1 of this year, and could be banned after mid-2025 under a proposal being considered by the House Transportation Committee.

The proposal, which would replace the current \$5 fee and eventually phase out studded tires, would raise an estimated \$3.5 million over the next two years. But that wouldn't make up for the estimated damage to state roads that a state Department of Transportation study puts at \$\_\_\_\_\_ million or more a year. (NW SUNDAY)
